It's exciting to see an event such as this being held in London, and great to see Credemus Associates recognise the gap, opportunity and need."

Hajo van Beijma said: "The use of mobile phones in developing countries has challenged traditional development aid. The omnipresence, accessibility and usability of mobile phones can create vast opportunities, and conferences such as these are necessary to support a future of collaboration across this industry."

Fiyaz Mughal said: "The use of mobile phones in community development is one of the unsung social phenomenons of our time. For this reason I hold a steadfast belief that in sharing these developments we can make a substantial and sustainable difference to both national and international communities. Africa

is leading the way, whilst influencers across the EU are simply out of touch in this realm. Our role within this series is to promote significant ICT4D growth throughout UK civil society and beyond."
